### **Loving God**

I'm reading a book now called Start with Why by Simon Sinek. I have found it helpful as I ask myself, "Why do we as Kansas Navigators do what we do?" Rather than focusing on <u>what</u> we do - memorizing Scripture, reading and studying His Word, helping others do the same– all of which are very appropriate, I have been asking myself the "why" question.

That could be answered many different ways (all valid): Because God commands us to do these things. Because He loves us and we want to serve Him. Because this is the best way to truly love someone else.

However, if we go back to basics, meaning the Great Commandment in Matthew 22:36-38, we learn that first and foremost we are to love God with all we have. That is primary. And that, for me, is the "why."

# Trusting God — Even when life hurts by Larry Beck

In chapter 1 of his book "Trusting God", Jerry Bridges poses a



question, "Can you trust God?" Well...depending on which word is emphasized, there are two possible meanings. Consider the first - "Can you <u>trust</u> God?" Questioning – is He trustworthy or dependable, especially in times of adversity. The second is "Can <u>you</u> trust God?" Questioning whether our relationship with God is such that we are confident that He has a loving purpose in our adversities and can help us in our time of need.

He also notes that "Obeying God is worked out within welldefined boundaries of God's revealed will. Trusting God is worked out in an arena that has no boundaries. We do not know the extent, the duration, or the frequency of the painful, adverse circumstances in which we must frequently trust God. We are always coping with the unknown."

Jerry categorically compiles the theological principles necessary to aid readers toward their growth in learning to trust God. Consider the following quote: "God in His love always wills what is best for us. In His wisdom He always know what is best, and in His sovereignty, He has the power to bring it about". This one succinct statement encapsulates the theological elements of God's perfect love, infinite wisdom and absolute sovereignty; all three truths are inseparable for the Christian struggling to trust God.

These truths are likened to a three-legged stool, if you remove any one the stool doesn't function as needed. Accordingly, consider that if we remove God's perfect love, it's possible He could be indifferent toward us in our struggles. If we remove His infinite wisdom, it's possible He could make a mistake in our lives, or if we remove His absolute sovereignty, it's possible He is limited in ability to help us in our time of need. But with God there are no such questions of possibility. (Continued on page 3)

## An "Aha" moment

Our Pastor started leading us through the study of Mark a few Sunday evenings ago. I was studying ahead and had one of those "aha" moments in Scripture that fires my pistons. It was the story in Mark chapter two, verses two to twelve, about four men bringing their paralytic friend to Jesus for

healing. You may remember the story. When they came to the house in Capernaum where Jesus was teaching the house was so crammed with people they couldn't get in. That's when they got dramatic. Determined to get their friend to Jesus, they climbed on the roof of the house, dug through the ceiling, and began to lower their friend's bed with ropes into the room where Jesus was.

In the CSB verse 5 begins with the phrase, "Seeing their faith ...," but in the NKJV it reads as, "When Jesus saw their faith ..." The account goes on to tell us that then Jesus forgave the paralytic of his sins and healed his paralysis. The "aha" moment for me with the realization that faith is something that can be seen, more importantly, something Jesus can see, and that when He sees it He responds.

I had to examine my heart and ask myself if I'm giving Jesus something worth looking at, something He can see and bless?

Yes, I know God can see everything all the time, but there is something more personal about miracles like this in the Bible. Consider the following points. First, Jesus was at work doing what He does, teaching, healing, and changing lives. Second, the four men were convinced Jesus could heal their friend and gave feet to their faith. Third, they didn't give up easily when they were blocked. Fourth, WHEN He could SEE they were fully committed (the roof damaged and the paralytic before Him) He acted.

When people commit to get involved with Jesus and His work, exciting things happen (see 2 Cor 4:6-7).

In these strange times, Jesus is still in the business of saving people from their sins and teaching them to walk in His ways. We can partner with Him by bringing our friends to Him like the four men in Mark's account. There are other things we can do that Jesus can see and bless as well. Grab and memorize a key verse of Scripture and ask God to help you understand and apply it to your life. Put an arm around a new believer and help them learn how to have a quiet time. There are many other things Jesus would probably like to see us doing and would be willing to bless when He sees us involved.

Get with the program.

Jerry writes, "Our lives are cluttered with a lot of "if only's." "If only I had done this," or "if only that had not happened." But God, has no "if only's". God never makes a mistake and has no regrets, "**As for God, His way is perfect.**" (**Ps 18:30**)

The book references **Psalm 139:16**, which states in part that "**the days ordained for me were written in your book before one of them came to be**". God has used this verse repeatedly in my life, in situations like the ER and Intensive care units with family members, while waiting for critical medical test results to be returned, beside the bed of the dying, being treated unjustly and experiencing the need for God's provision when there were no apparent resources to rely on. I needed a truth to quell my anxieties – helping me reason that God knew of these situations before I was born, they were no surprise to Him and He had a wise and loving purpose in bringing them.

Most of us will not learn to trust God until we have to, thus times of adversity are required for our faith in God to grow. Trusting God is a choice, requiring His Word be understood and applied to our minds, despite our emotions or perceptions of what God is doing.

There has always been a special blessing from being in a garden. Even a simple vegetable garden with some flowers and a few shrubs inspires wonderful memories from my farm days. It is a place of quiet transformation for creative thoughts about our earthly life. It is the place where we feel so much *at home* with God's creation — even while we are still here on earth. We all need a special place to be **reassured** 



that somehow, all will be well – as in Romans 8 : 28 "All things work together for good – for those who love God and are called according to his purpose."
