Establish

Establishing a new believer in his/ her faith is an exciting, yet sometimes daunting task. Prayerful perseverance is required! God has called us to Evangelize (Matt. 4:19), Establish (Matt. 28:18-20) and Equip (2 Timothy 2:2). Here are some ideas on this phase of disciple-making:

- Always start at the "beginning," even if the person seems mature in their faith. Why? They will in turn disciple others as they were discipled. Consider starting with the Beginning with Christ verses and The Wheel Illustration.
- 2. Keep it relational: Demonstrate true love and concern for the person, with authentic, vulnerable sharing of your life.
- 3. Clearly communicate the goal: knowing Jesus better. Scripture memory, the Wheel, etc, are simply tools to know and love Him better!

Our Unconscious Witness

He was a student from China studying at our local state school.

Even though he faithfully attended our ESL class at church, he openly stated that he did not believe in Jesus. He was an extremely intelligent young man and was widely read. He simply did not believe all this "religious" stuff.



As the months went on, the Holy Spirit, through the Word of God transformed him. He came to see that indeed Jesus was who He claimed to be. He expressed his trust in Jesus as his Savior. What made the difference? Was it the great teaching at the ESL class? Was it the American friends who reached out to him? Was it a truth that we were able to communicate?

While all these likely played a role in his transformation, the one thing that our Chinese student expressed was that there was "this student pilot at school who was going to give up a lucrative career in aviation in order to become a missionary pilot." That really impressed our Chinese friend!

That student pilot didn't really try to convince our friend of the truth of Scripture. Instead he just lived his faithful life in front of our friend and this is what impressed him.

Jesus said, "In the same way, let your light shine before people, so that they can see your good deeds and give honor to your Father in heaven." (Matt. 5:16, NET Bible). Who is observing your life today? Is it your children, your coworkers, your neighbors? Let your light shine so they may see your faithfulness and the love of Jesus.

Book review: "The Adventure of Discipling Others" by Ron Bennett and John Purvis (Pub. Navpress, © 2003

If you need a great resource on disciplemaking, this book is it! I have found it to be most helpful, particularly when I am looking for encouragement or for individual stories to share with others.

It is arranged as a series of twelve sessions, designed to be used in a group setting to learn discipleship principles. As the preface states "<u>The Adventure of Discipling Others</u> is designed to be used simultaneously with the actual experience of discipling at least one other person. Learning by doing is critical to making this material authentic rather than academic. There's no substituting to stepping out and investing your life in someone else's life. Such faith pleases God, and His resources are always adequate."

There is a great description of an overview of the discipling process, definitions, assumptions and core components. In order to keep it from being academic only, the authors include multiple stories and examples which are truly inspiring as you learn various discipleship principles.

It might be difficult to use this one-on-one with an individual you are training, except to use it as a resource or reference work. I've used it that way and have assigned specific stories or principles to cover and then discussed it with people. It is more designed as a training manual for those wanting to know how to disciple others and then go out and apply the principles learned. Stories by Larry Glabe, Jack Griffin, Becky Brodin ("Finding the Right Person to Disciple"), Dawson Trotman, Skip Gray, Lorne Sanny, Joni Eareckson Tada, J. Oswald Sanders and many others make this a fantastic resource.
