Finally, disciples are "commissioned" to carry the good news to others, helping them grow in their faith and be able to reproduce in still others.

Bartlesville, Oklahoma Mini-retreat

Richard Spann, David Dennis and others traveled to Grace Community Church in Bartlesville, Oklahoma



Sunday, February 24 to meet with Elmo Joseph and about 15 men to present a mini-conference. Elmo continues to faithfully minister wherever he goes, encouraging others and making disciples.

David spoke on "My Life's Objective." The Kansas Communities Ministry asks us to memorize this objective which is "to know Christ in my own life in ever-increasing depth and to make disciples and develop laborers at all times, under any conditions, in every place I go." He noted that there is great value to having an objective for our life and that the Apostle Paul expressed his objective in Phil. 3:14: "with this goal in mind, I strive toward the prize of the upward call of God in Christ Jesus." We are to major in knowing Christ by a daily walk with Him, intake of His Word, meditating upon and obeying it. Then, as exemplified by Elmo, we are to "make disciples (Matt. 28:18-20), develop laborers (Matt. 9:36-38) at all times, under conditions, in every place we go.

Richard spoke on the importance of the individual. He noted that a study of the Gospels shows that Jesus invested about 30% of His time with larger groups/crowds, another 30% with smaller groups and about 40% of His time with individuals. Repeatedly in Scripture, God relates that He seeks individuals: 2 Chronicles 16:9: "For the eyes of the Lord range throughout the earth to strengthen those whose hearts are fully committed to Him" and Ezekiel 22:30: "I looked for a man among them..." Richard urged us to spend personal time with individuals, sharing life on life, praying together, sharing the Word together. Look for four generations (2 Timothy 2:2) and find those who will reproduce their lives in others.

We appreciate Elmo's faithfulness and example over the years in investing in individuals, seeing many through to maturity who then reproduce in others.
